Using Facebook to Aid in your Search

You may have noticed the recent trend in birthparents and adoptees using Facebook as a tool in their search for one another.

The first person I saw doing this was Jennessa Simons. She was born in 1991 and adopted by a couple who lived near Salt Lake City, Utah. Recently, Jenessa turned to Facebook to search for her birthparents. I consider her to be the first person to do so and her picture was shared 165,000 times.



Jenessa graciously agreed to answer some questions from me about using social media to find her birthparents.

Coley: Tell us a little bit about yourself

Jennessa: I grew up in Utah, just a half hour outside of Salt Lake City. I had only one brother, adopted also, and while we fought like animals while were young, we eventually grew to love one another. My mother was a stay at home mom, and my dad worked tirelessly to take care of us. My adoptive parents never made a secret of my

adoption, or my brothers. As soon as we were old enough to

understand, she explained we had 'tummy mommies', and that this did not change anything, that she and my father loved us like their own. I never doubted this, and never questioned my life with my

adoptive parents. I believe I grew up where I needed to be.

Coley: Have you always been curious/wanted to find your birth parents?

Jennessa: I was always curious about my adoption, and my birth parents. It wasn't a constant thought by any means, but whereas others can look in the mirror and see their father's nose and mother's hair. I always wondered who had given me which.

Coley: What made you decide the time was right when you started to search?

Jennessa: My initial search began when I was eighteen. I had moved out and was living with a friend's family. My friend was curious about my adoption, and

in the course of a discussion on the topic, I began to entertain the idea of finding my birth parents. My friend was extremely supportive, but after no contact from my adoption agency, and after seeing how many registries had a twenty one year old age restriction, I became discouraged and allowed it to fall from my list of priorities.

This time around, with my Facebook picture, I didn't think I would have any results. I had sent off paperwork to the Mutual Consent Registry and registered with <u>isrr.org</u> and hadn't heard from either so far. I looked at my son one day and thought "How could my birth mother have placed me? I know just how much I love my boy; that must have taken a strength I can only imagine.

Coley: Why did you turn to Facebook to aid in your search and what gave you the idea to use Facebook?

Jennessa: I had seen pictures of kids online, holding posters saying "One million likes and our parents will buy us a puppy!" They were getting the likes (and hopefully the parents upheld the other end of the bargain), so I thought, why not me? What could it hurt? So I made my poster, and asked my friends to help me out. Thirty or so shares and I went to bed Sunday night, mildly hopeful, but not expecting much.

Coley: What was the response to you using Facebook to find your birthparents? Jennessa: The response to my picture was overwhelming. I posted it Sunday afternoon and went to bed with around thirty shares, majority friends, and a couple friends of friends. I woke up on Monday morning with five thousand shares, and eight new friend requests. I had two new emails in the account I'd listed on my poster, people wishing me good luck.

That by itself was surprising. By the end of the day I had seven thousand shares, twenty more emails, and more friend requests. On Tuesday morning, I'd jumped to twenty-three thousand shares. I was trying to answer everyone on my email, and was already making new acquaintances. I can't remember how many friend requests I had.

That was the day my birth mother contacted me. The last time I checked that day, my picture was at forty three thousand shares.

Coley: Did you find your birthparents via Facebook? **Jennessa:** Yes! I was able to find my birth family through Facebook. My birth mother gave me information for my birth father the same day she contacted me, and I began texting him soon after. I have since had the pleasure of meeting both of them, and getting to know them better. They are two wonderful people and I feel blessed to have them in my life!

Coley: Do you have any advice for others using Facebook to find their birthparents?

Jennessa: My first piece of advice for others who decide to use Facebook is to be careful with your personal information. I put mine out there without a thought to what might happen and I'm grateful that nothing bad has happened to me because of it. Secondly, join adoption pages, as many as you can. Build contacts and connections. Third, please don't give up your search. I had people emailing me saying they had found their birth families after over thirty years of searching or were still looking, despite the odds. Just don't give up. Have hope. And, if you believe in an afterlife, have faith that if vou do not find them in this life, you will in the next.

Coley: Has this whole experience made you an advocate for adoptee Origi-

I was terrified that my birth parents would not be what I expected. Or maybe they had been wounded, or, God forbid, had died. I believe you need to work for

your goal of finding your family, because if you do it on a whim, it may be a shock. But I want families reunited. You have a right to know where you came from.
